ANNOUNCE AND CELEBRATE YOUR ENGAGEMENT

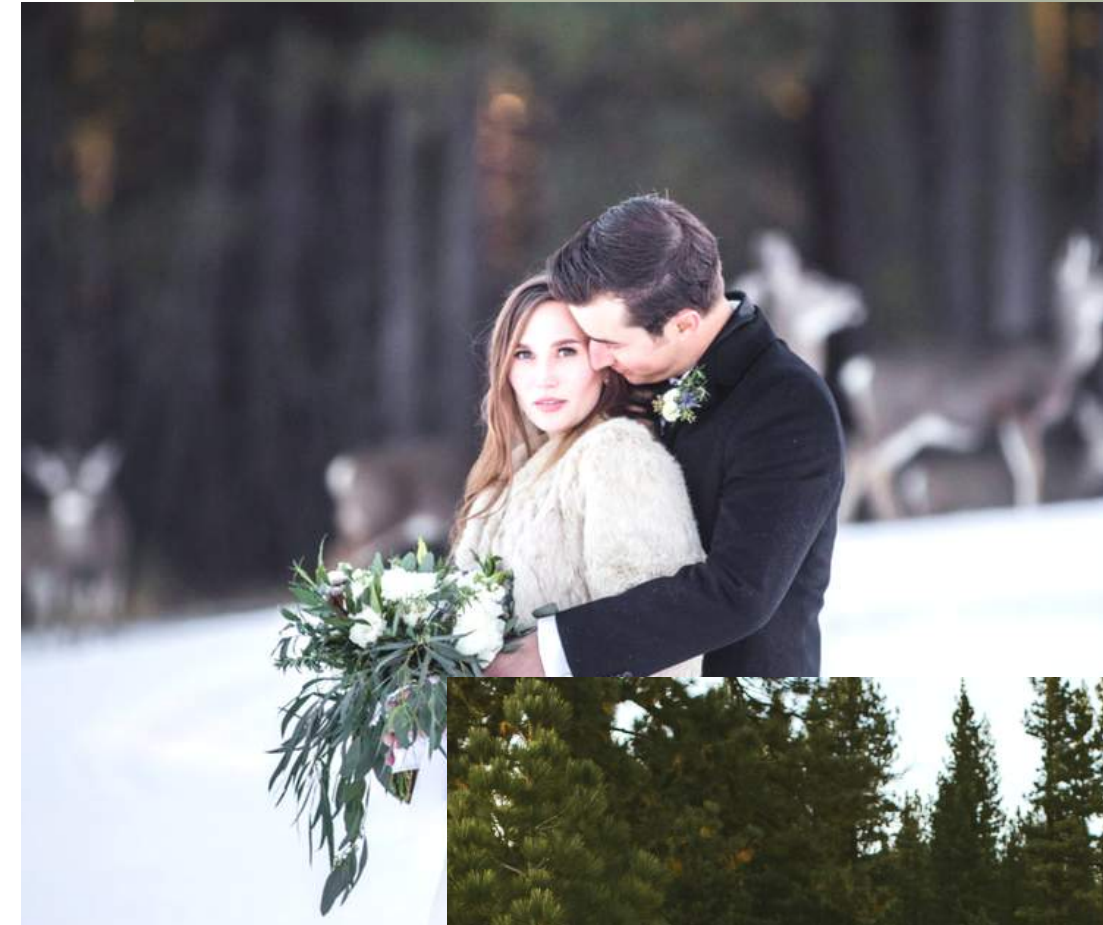

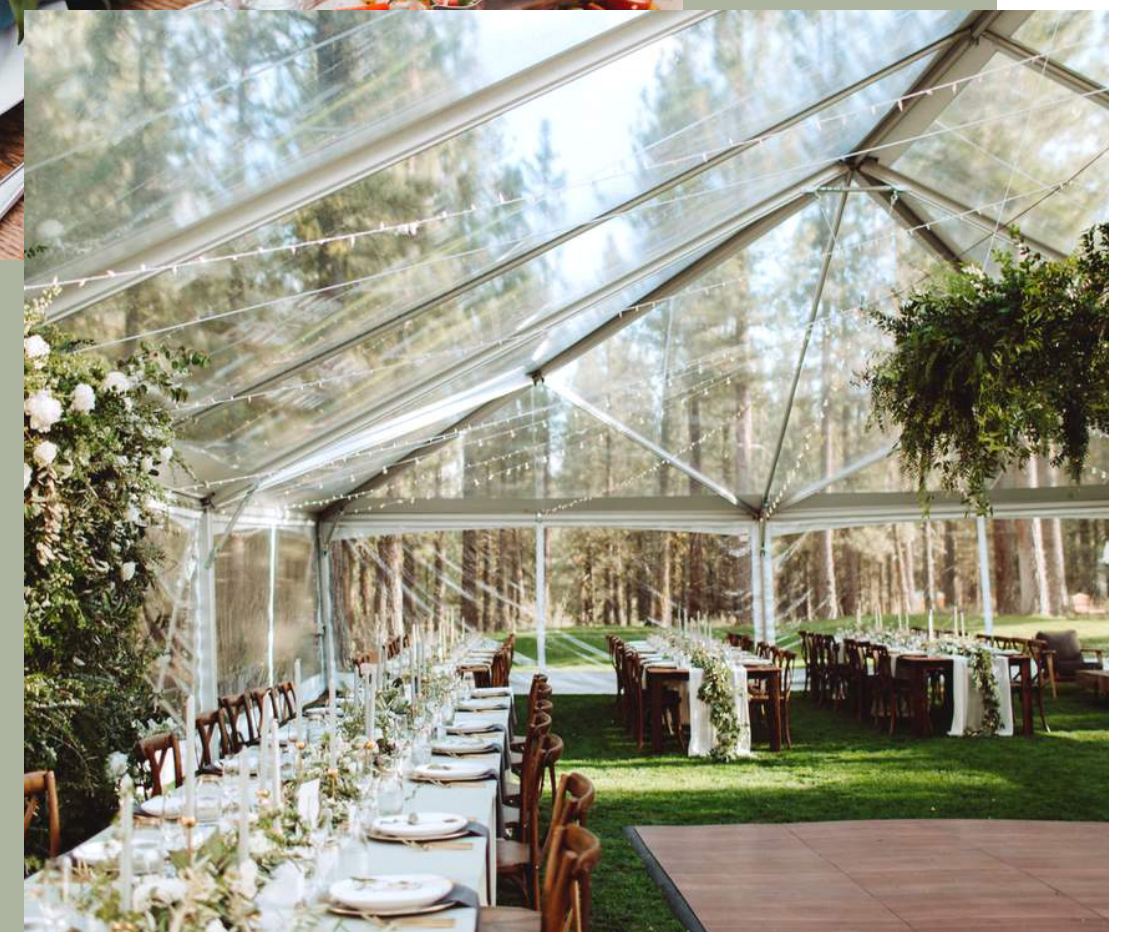

DRAFT A PRELIMINARY GUEST LIST
